Hebrew Classes

Ongoing classes meet Tuesdays at 1:30pm. Hebrew instruction, focusing on reading and studying Hebrew verbs.

We live with balances, the balance of brain and body, the balance of soul and body, the balance of love and respect. Both our physical being and our mind demand constant attention. The one cannot function without the other. Such is the push of our “exercise generation” that we now understand that a healthy body has to move in concert with a well-balanced mind. The mind needs exercise just as we seek to exercise our other muscles, and in so doing we nourish the integrity of both aspects of our being. But the reality is that often the mind-body balance is thrown off, and we over-emphasize one aspect at the expense of the other.

A great literary example of this idea comes from Thomas Mann's novel, *The Magic Mountain*. In this magisterial story, Mann returns to the attitudes of his characters towards their spiritual and physical lives. Here we find a debate between a priest and a humanist. The priest praises the value of the soul, extolling the virtues of a life focused on the mind. The cleric tells the humanist that the higher life would be a spiritual one, where concerns and bodily afflictions could be forgotten. The humanist answers the priest with a telling insight. True it is that we might extoll the wonders of the spirit, but to enter the realm of spiritual satisfaction we still need the body. The humanist reminds his friend that without one's physical presence we could never enjoy the pleasures of the mind and spirit. This wonderful story is so important because we understand that there is no such thing as a “disembodied” mind. We live with our bodies, through our bodies, and in spite of our bodies. A healthy blend of partnership is the key to a healthy life. Finding that blend, that equilibrium, is a life-long process. It is the wedding of our physical and mental maturity.

When we return to Thomas Mann's story we are reminded that our lives are grounded on the ground. We need to nurture all aspects of our human-ness. If I may extend this metaphor farther, we might say that

the Maccabees fought their battles in the midst of that spiritual battle which engrossed the Romans and the Jews in the second century. The Romans exemplified the sculptural arts, and the cultivation of the physical body. The Jewish community, beleaguered on many levels, stressed the importance of study, prayer, and a more democratic way of living. Many Judeans believed that the key to success was assimilation, adopting the Roman way of life. The Maccabees and their followers realized they had to re-dedicate their lives to a more spiritual way,



in order to maintain the values of biblical Judaism. Without the physical battle against the Seleucid armies, our nascent Jewish nation might have been over-run by the Greco-Roman world view. Today we look at the Chanukah story as a battle between the little “guys” versus the decadent Roman empire. Surely that battle in 167 BCE was much more than a military campaign, it was a fight to preserve

the Jewish values of the Torah. The sages of the second century knew about the mind-body interplay, they understood that without spiritual freedom there would be no future for Jewish living and practice.

This Chanukah remember to re-dedicate your lives to the values of our Jewish life, and enjoy the light and the balance of our physical-spiritual world.


Torah Documentary Film Available Soon

A short documentary capturing highlights of the CBT's inspiring Torah Restoration Challenge will be soon be available for viewing on the Internet, while a special new version will be available for purchase in time for Chanukah.

The new, longer film is an expanded version (15 to 20 minutes long) of the documentary that premiered on Oct. 26 at CBT. It will include everything that was in the shorter version, plus fascinating details about the special elements that make a Torah kosher, the restoration process itself, and more interviews with congregants.

The film stars our beautiful 100 year old Torah and movingly describes the significance of the Torah to the Jewish people. The supporting cast features Rabbi Moshe Druin, the specially trained Torah scribe from Miami who undertook the restoration, plus our own Rabbi Levy and members of our congregation. It contains a number of familiar faces plus a dramatic twist, when Rabbi Druin is faced with an unexpected and daunting challenge.

The expanded version is now in the process of being edited



and will be available in time to purchase for Chanukah gift giving, at \$18 per copy. Whether or not you took part in the Torah Restoration Challenge, you won't want to miss the chance to purchase a copy of this unique and stirring film for yourself and for loved ones!

The short version of the documentary (8 minutes long) will soon be available for viewing on the Internet. Details about how to view it and how to purchase the expanded version will be released as soon as they are available.

Santa Fe Jewish Film Festival Screens Israeli Film *Brothers*



The Santa Fe Jewish Film Festival is screening *Brothers*, official selection of the Israel Film Festivals in New York, Los Angeles and Miami where it won “Best of the Fest.” It is the story of two brothers, physically separated since youth, only to find they are separated along ideological and religious lines when reunited as adults. On one level the divide is over whether the Ultra-Orthodox should serve in the Israeli military, an issue which is dividing Israeli society today. At a deeper level, it is about the role religion plays in defining a Jew and the challenges Israel faces in balancing a democratic state with a Jewish one.

The screening will be followed by supper at a local restaurant, with a talk by noted Israeli speaker Elliot Chodoff. Mr. Chodoff is a Mideast political and military analyst and founder and senior editor of *MidEast: On Target*. 

Chanukah Yesterday & Today

Chanukah is both an uplifting and complex story.

From our Tradition we read of the Maccabees battle for freedom, a story which is recorded in the extra-canonical literature known as the Apocrypha. Why was the Chanukah saga left out of the Hebrew Bible? The leaders were afraid of glorifying a military victory, which was overturned a few years later. The cruse of oil which symbolizes Chanukah for us, seemed an appropriate symbol, namely a sign of religious freedom.




Chanukah embodies our desire for religious freedom which we often take for granted in our country. But given local politics in the Southwest, replete with issues like prayers at football games, and the proliferation of Christmas symbols in our public schools, we cannot afford to take our liberties for granted. Chanukah is vitally important for us because it reminds us that our society upholds freedom of religion for all faiths. This holiday also teaches that military victories are short lived. When the Maccabees defeated the Syrians in 164 BCE, the battle for religious freedom did not end on the hills outside of modern Tel Aviv. Less than a decade later, Judah and his family fell in battle, and the practice of Judaism was curtailed by outside political forces. Our religion survived, not because of military prowess but because we knew how to adapt to the secular Greek culture of the day. When faced with severe outside threats, we Jews began to cultivate new ways to re-invigorate our religious life. We do the same in modern America, as we have adopted new holidays, e.g. Yom HaAtzma'ut and Yom HaShoah (Holocaust remembrance day), and we have created new prayer books and study materials.

This season, join your fellow Beit Tikva members for a great Chanukah celebration on the first day, Sunday, December 9th. The beauty of Chanukah is not about size or quantity (of presents). Greatness is our capacity to be unique and flexible in facing the future. Each of us determines our own greatness, and each soul is indispensable to our loved ones, and the community. Make this festival a wonderful celebration for all your friends and family. —*Rabbi Martin Levy*
