## Passover and the Righteous Gentile

In a few weeks we shall celebrate the wondrous festival of Passover. We will gather around our Seder tables to recount the story of oppression and redemption.

Among the lesser known figures of this story are two women, Shiphrah and Puah. Let me refresh your memories about these women. When hard labor failed to degrade the ranks of the Israelites in Egypt, Pharaoh began a new strategy. He summoned Shiphrah and Puah, the midwives who presided at most of the births in the Israelite community. He instructed, "When you deliver the Hebrew women look at the birthstool, and if it is a boy, kill him. If it is a girl, let her live."

The story continues, "The midwives, fearing the Almighty, did not do as instructed by Pharaoh. They let the boys live." These women defied an evil dictator in order to say "Yes" to God. What do we know about Shiphrah and Puah? They are described as midwives, but there is a rabbinic tradition that translates the text as "midwives to the Hebrews." According to that rabbinic commentary, these women were not Jewish but Egyptian! If this is true, then they are the first recorded members of a unique community—the community described by the Sages as "the righteous ones among the peoples of the world," or simply, "the righteous gentiles."

In our time the category of the "the righteous gentile" has been especially poignant. We know the stories of Jews who survived the Holocaust because some Christians, under extreme personal risk, defied the Nazi authorities and befriended our people. In my congregation in Houston, we counted two survivors who had been saved



by Christians, and three other members who survived the concentration camps. One chronicle recalls that "hiding a Jew was not an easy matter...if caught, the host was usually executed on the spot or hanged in a public place as an object lesson to Aryans who entertained the notion of hiding a Jew."

At this Passover season we are commanded to "Know the heart of the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt." It is fitting to remember Shiphrah and Puah and all those righteous souls who befriended the strangers in their midst.

May that remembrance lend additional meaning to the Haggadah's words, "Let all who are hungry come and eat, let all who are in want share the hope of redemption."

## Dear Friends,

In this early spring edition of the Bulletin, I would like to talk about renewal. Our congregation has experienced sudden tragedy in the death of our president, Paul Grace. And along with that difficult bereavement, we have recently lost a number of members. Some unfortunately have moved or died. Others, also unfortunately, became disengaged and chose not to continue. Some wonderful new members have joined us, but not enough to maintain membership numbers or income. This attrition is a significant issue and one that will require creative solutions to sustain our existence. Yet, we are determined to rejuvenate our congregation and be a better than ever home for our members. Our Board is hard at work with many new ideas and we will keep you posted.

Starting in March, we will be renting space to HaMakom. If the sharing of space is successful and the partnership of our congregations is appealing to both groups, we can explore the possibility of uniting our congregations in some way. At present, the blending of calendars has been remarkably easy—HaMakom has a once-monthly Friday night service and the Rabbi has one Friday night off, so we are able to accommodate them. They have a Saturday morning service that begins at 10:30am, shortly after Rabbi Levy finishes his Torah Study class. We have had some Friday night visitors from HaMakom and perhaps some of our congregants will want to attend HaMakom's service on Saturday morning. Their Hazzan, Cindy Freedman, will be singing at our Second Night Community Passover Seder and we are grateful for her participation.

Within our own congregation, we need to foster more personal connections between congregants, and between the Rabbi and congregants. For many of us, the Temple is where we find our family away from home. Santa Fe has many retirees from around the country and, just as we did when Gary and I moved here 10 years ago, they seek out the Jewish community to create a new social network. We already have an identity as the “friendly congregation” and that's what we need to build on. More connections between our congregants will inspire more warm feelings to visitors and prospective members. And more connection between the Rabbi and our members will foster a greater allegiance to our Temple. We need to strengthen our spiritual identity and make our presence wider known in the community.

Every one of us knows someone they could invite to Shabbat services, to one of our educational programs, to our 92Y video events, to our Purim Spiel, to our Passover Seder, and to High Holiday Services. As we move to enhance our congregation's participation, and in turn encourage our membership to extend themselves to others to make us better known in the community, our underlying motivation is to make Congregation Beit Tikva's reputation as the welcoming congregation be the unifying principle that sustains and nourishes us as leaders in the Jewish community of Santa Fe.

## SOCIAL ACTION AT CONGREGATION BEIT TIKVA **Feeding the Homeless**

For years, Congregation Beit Tikva has collected clothes for the homeless at two of St. Elizabeth's Shelters, The Men's Emergency Shelter on Alarid St. and the Casa Familia Shelter (Women and Families) on Berry St. We would like to expand our help to them by providing dinners.

Here are our possibilities:

A community group could choose the day(s) to deliver a dinner. Many of the groups presently do one day/month (i.e., the first Monday of the month), but the number of days is flexible. We could choose to provide the dinners to one of the shelters, to both, or alternate between the two. All food for the dinner must be delivered by 5:00pm. We could bring it all at

once, or individuals responsible for different dishes could bring it during the day at their convenience. The “host” group for the dinner is welcome to join the Shelter guests for dinner, but it is not mandatory. No evening duties are required; Shelter staff and guests take care of everything.

Another option—Some groups choose to bring bags of groceries. There's always a need for items like milk, fresh fruits and vegetables. One group donates bags of enchiladas as a special treat!

Please consider helping with such an important project. Groups are asked to prepare for 35 people. We need members who are willing to participate on a consistent basis. The food could be prepared at home

or purchased from a store or restaurant.

It should not be very time consuming if we have people who are willing to donate and deliver.

Contact Sandy Levine (levinesy@comcast.net; 505 466-4041) to express your interest. We'll then be able to coordinate our efforts with the Shelters.

# Information On Charitable Contributions From IRA's

Tired of paying too much in taxes? Here's a way to lower your tax bill and also do a mitzvah. Taxpayers are allowed to exclude from their gross income otherwise taxable distributions from their IRA that are paid directly to Congregation Beit Tikva. This distribution must meet the following requirements:

1. The distribution must be from an IRA.
2. The IRA account holder must be at least 70 ½ years old.
3. The distribution must flow directly from the IRA to Congregation Beit Tikva.
4. The distribution must be what would otherwise be considered a taxable IRA withdrawal.

For someone who does not itemize their charitable donations, this would be extremely advantageous since the distribution in this manner would not be added to their taxable gross income.

For someone who does itemize their charitable donations, it would still be advantageous since the distribution in this manner would then have the effect of being 100% deductible from their income, an effect that may not occur by just making a regular donation to Congregation Beit Tikva. Also, a direct donation from the IRA would count towards the Required Minimum Distribution amount mandated by the IRS for taxpayers over the age of 70 ½. You should contact your financial adviser for the

## Congregation Beit Tikva Policy Guidelines On Parking



Parking guidelines are a necessary part of our Congregation's increased awareness for a vigilant and proactive security policy. This policy enables Beit Tikva to tow or otherwise address vehicles parked on our lot under certain defined circumstances.

The parking lot at Beit Tikva is available to Congregation members, family, and friends. No permits or other identifying tags are required.

However, cars left unattended for an extended period of 3 hours or more (outside the time frame of a synagogue event or other active synagogue business) without notice to the Board and/or Administrator *may* be subject to towing. Vehicles parked suspiciously may also prompt an immediate call to police to investigate.

If a Member (or member's family or friend, through that Member) finds it necessary to leave a car in the parking lot for an extended period of 3 hours or more, outside the time frame of a Beit Tikva event or activity, they must do the following:

1. **Notify any Board member or the Administrator that a car will be left in the parking lot.** (Please provide

the make, color, and license plate number of the car in question.) The contacted Board member will make the Administrator and President aware of this information.

Board members with key access to the building who need to leave cars for more than 3 hours during the day unattended (i.e. while not remaining at the synagogue) can instead leave a note on the Administrator's office desk.

2. We request that the owner also **place a piece of paper on the driver's side dashboard** with the Member's name clearly visible.

If notification is not made, the car *may* be subject to towing at the owner's expense. A decision to tow requires approval by an Executive Committee member (the President, or any other Executive Committee member if the President is not available in a timely manner) PLUS an additional Board member or the Administrator.

Vehicles parked suspiciously may, however, prompt a call for police to investigate based on the judgment of an individual Board member or staff member.

This Policy has been in effect since January 1, 2016.
